The executive committee of the Young Men's Republican Club of the State, have issued the following address to the Young Republicans of Kansas:

TOPEKA, KAN., Sept. 6, 1880.

HEADQUARTERS YOUNG MEN'S REPUBLICAN CLUB OF KANSAS.

In response to a general desire, there was formed in Topeka during the Republican State Convention an organization to be known as the Young Men's Republican Club of Kansas, the object being to more fully identify the young men of the State with the grand old Republican party and enlist their services in behalf of its time-honored principles. That this might be more effectually accomplished, it was decided to organize subordinate clubs in every county in the State, that every young Republican might have an opportunity of assisting the cause in his immediate locality and contributing to the success of the general movement. Dedication.

MR. EDITOR:—The dedication of the new Presbyterian Church in Osage township took place on last Sabbath. Rev. Hahn had called to his assistance Rev. S. M. Irwin, of Geneva, and Rev. Hill, of Kansas City. About 270 persons were in attendance. Rev. Hill delivered an excellent sermon in which he pictured nicely the great influence and necessity of a religious element in every community, contrasting and comparing religious with non-religious people and localities. After the sermon Rev. Hahn made statements as follows: Amount of money expended—cost of church—about \$1400. Expected from Board of Education about \$400. The church completed except trivial finish work, but encumbered to the extent of money expected from Education Board. Then followed the regular dedicatory exercise, after which the congregation was dismissed. After intermission an opportunity was offered those wishing to unite with the church.

Taking into consideration the size of the class and general encumbrances of a new country, the erection of so neat a church must reflect credit upon those who have talked and worked with uniting zeal to complete the work. We should not neglect to mention some excellent music given by a choir selected protem. Osage is blest with musical talent.
